

Cardinal Stritch cage coaches pleased with season outlook

Cardinal Stritch boys

Preview: Returning for the new coach is junior forward Kam Hughes, who contributed 4.7 points and 3.6 rebounds to last year's league championship team. The Cardinals reached the Division III district finals,

where they fell to Archbold, 59-56. Joining Hughes in the paint will be junior forward Breon Hicks.

"Kam Hughes was All-TAAC last year. He's the only player who has varsity experience who is real good," Harris said. "Breon Hicks is very

athletic. He played in a Toledo fall league. He's a high jumper, a high-flyer, and has a chance to be one of the best on the defensive side in the TAAC.

Harris believes this year's version of Stritch boys basketball could still find itself in the race for a TAAC title. $\,$

"I'm definitely looking forward to it. I think we should be in the top three, realistically, if we do our job," Harris said.
"There are going to be some hiccups

here and there, but we are going to still build off it, and the guys who have been here, Tommie Taylor, Owen Carter, and Christian Burton have shown tremendous

"Even though we are young, those guys have stepped up. From day one, those guys have been in the gym and in the weight room. They've been doing excellent in the classroom — at least two of three of them are honor roll, so that as a coach is very fa-

The style of basketball played at Stritch will not change that much, either.

"Defensively, we are going to run a man-to-man with an occasional zone. I think our perimeter defense is very good. Our guards are tremendous athletes and then offensively, we'll run a lot of dribbledrive stuff and we'll run a lot of transition," Harris said.

"We have five guys who can get down the floor, with Cam and Breon in the post, we'll be very solid. We just have to try and space it out and let our creators make things happen."

Two seniors, guard Demontri Whitehead and forward Tanner Nowicki seniors, have a shot at moving into the starting lineup, too, and will "get their minutes" after joining the team this year.

"Our biggest weakness might be depth because we are young, but we do have a deep bench. That's one thing that we'll be maybe using a nie-man rotation every night," Harris said.

"We'll have balanced scoring from Kam, Christian, Tommie, and Breon will all score, but we won't have a guy who will score 20 every night, but we have guys who might get there. What they've shown in scrimmages and open gyms is that we are willing to make the extra passes, willing to get everyone involved."

Preview: Stritch returns seven letter winners, including Sydney Payeff (4.6 pts., 3.7 asst.) and Linnea Hughes (10.6 pts., 4 reb.).

"I feel we are very athletic and very balanced," coach Hohenberger said. "We have great bigs, star guards, and defensive minded stoppers. All these pieces when they come together will make us a very good team. We are not as deep as previous seasons, but we are talented and hungry to turn things around and put Stritch back on the map, as a top school for women's basketball in this area."

Hughes was second team All-TAAC, honorable mention All-District 7 and third team Alan Miller Jewelers All-Press, while Payeff was HM All-TAAC and District 7.

'Sydney Payeff is going into her third year as our starting point guard and I expect

her to take a huge step forward as a leader and decision maker," Hohenberger said.

"Linnea Hughes, I feel, is going to have a huge year as well. She was our leading scorer as a freshman and this summer and fall she has added so many dimensions to her game offensively. I think she will be a star for us at

the guard position. Not only is Linnea Hughes one of our top players but her brother here at Stritch, Kam Hughes, is a top player for the boys. They both are going to have huge seasons

"I expect Linnea Hughes and Asia Brown, our two sophomores to be our leading scorers this season. Both have the ability and skill to be true game changers. I expect Sydney Payeff to have a tremendous year at the point and be our key distributor. She has led us in assists the last two years and I see no reason she won't do so again.

That trio is surrounded by veterans.

Keera Garmon is a tenacious defender. She will be matched up with the best player on the other team every single night. She has room to expand her game offensively as a senior and she should have a huge year," Hohenberger said.

"Keera Garmon will be our lock down defender. She has an endless motor, and she is not only athletic, but also extremely intelligent. Add all that together and you have a player who I think will be one of the top defenders in our league. Analise Quiroga at the forward spot is a do it all player. She defends both guards and bigs and offensively she will crash the glass hard for putbacks and is developing a good midrange jumper.



Clay cagers face tough task competing in tough conference

Clay boys

Coach: Joel Visser, first year Last Year: 4-12 (2-5 TRAC)

Key Players: Ben Jones, Sr., PG; Max Alm, Sr., C; Garret Long, Sr, G

Preview: Gone at Clay 6-foot-8 center Frank Waganfeald (14.3 pts., 9.2 reb., 57% FG), 6-0 guard Keeghan Calkins (11.2 pts.) and 6-4 forward Noah Hagdohl (15.2 pts., 6.4 reb., 44% FG, 78% FT).

The trio led a strong senior class last year, and Waganfeald has joined former Oak Harbor standout Jac Alexander, where both are playing collegiately at Marietta

University.

There is another shakeup — first-year coach Joel Visser is replacing David Rodriguez, who coached four years. Visser coached four years at Swanton and

two at Tipp City Tippecanoe before coming to Oregon. At Tippecanoe, his 2015 team qualified for district tournament action. and he was named District 9 Division II Coach of the Year after Red Devils finished 16-9. Visser also coached in Richmond,

At Clay, no single player started last year and besides senior point guard Ben Jones, no one has regular varsity minutes from the previous season, says Visser. However, the first year coach says "team chemistry" seems to be a strength already.

Visser has just one returning letterman, Jones, but Jones is flanked by two classmates, center Max Alm and guard Garret Long, as key players. Visser says Jones has "good vision" and a "high basketball IQ and very unselfish."

Two juniors, Collin Berryman and Lucas Measel, will take over the forward position. Visser says the 6-foot-4 Measel and junior Collin Berryman have shown significant improvement already since he took over the program.

'Lucas Measel and Collin Berryman have both dedicated themselves over the last year to learning multiple positions and being able to faceup as well as play with his back to basket," Visser said.

Big men joining Alm in the paint will be juniors Marcus Rahm and Kaden Rife.

Visser says the team's focus will be on defense and rebounding. Leading the defense will be senior Garret Long and juniors Evin Baker and Rahm.

Also expected to contribute is a sophomore, Lucas Jeremy, with a good shooting "He is a guy who applies what he

learns and gets a little better every day with the ability to shoot the ball from the perimeter," Visser said. Visser is eager to get an introduction

into the Three Rivers Athletic Conference, where Clay has failed to win a title in its over 10-year history.

"The TRAC has some of the best basketball in the state of Ohio. It will be a grind each week," Visser said.

Preview: First-year coach Keith Kennedy takes over for Julia Henneman-Dallape, who filled in for one season. Kennedy spent the past three years as boys junior varsity coach at Clay and he has run several levels within AAU programs. Kennedy inherits four letter winners, including returning starter Lexi Huntermark.

We are very excited to see the progression of our three-year starter Lexi Huntermark," Kennedy said. "We are transitioning her from the point guard position to the 'two' (position) as she is a natural scorer and attacker. I think this will take Lexi's game to the next level.'

Also returning is guard Camryn Reiter (7 pts., 6 reb., 3 stls., 2 def., 2 asst.) and forward Meah Przybylski (5.7 reb.)

'Camryn Reiter is a junior and threeyear varsity player. Camryn is an extremely versatile player and will play the one and four (positions) for us. Camryn is a coach's dream, hard-working and willing to do anything to help us win," Kennedy said.

Other returning letter winners are seniors Carmen Madrid and Jessica Payeff.

Carmen Madrid is a senior that will provide much needed leadership within our young program. Carmen will play mainly in the four and five

position.

"Another senior we are excited to have back is Jess Payeff, who is extremely quick both north and south as well as laterally. She

will provide us much needed defensive pressure on opposing guards. Jess should be a key component to our defensive philosophy this season."

There are newcomers to Clay's varsity team who will contribute, too.

We have been very impressed with freshman Brynn Reiter. She will primarily play the 'one' for us. Brynn has the intangibles you can't teach. We see a very bright future for her here at Clay," said Kennedy.

'Last but not least are sophomore's Kaelani Chanthakham and Kendra Stevens, juniors Alaysia Downer, Sydney Witek, Selena Garcia (Notre Dame transfer) Mae Hunt and the Derrer twins (Isabella and Julia). They all will play key minutes for us," Kennedy said.

Kennedy said the biggest challenge of all will be trying to get wins in the Three Rivers Athletic Conference.

"We plan to play a fast-paced guard heavy offense. Our defensive philosophy is to create offensive opportunities out of defensive pressure," Kennedy said. "We are small but quick and are looking forward to being the David against the TRAC Goliaths. We are asking them to believe this year, believe in themselves, believe in our program as we are all one, we are family. It is the reality that all of our players' roles are equally important, whether it's a threeminute sub or a four-quarter player."




Eastwood boys, girls squads believe they can contend

Preview: This year, the Eagles have nearly everyone back — the biggest loss to graduation was senior shooting guard Isaac Badenhop, who contributed 10.1 points, 2.6 rebounds and 2.7 assists.



ward Jake Meyer, who will be a four-year letter winner after averaging 13 points, 6.5 rebounds, 1.5 blocks, 1.6 assists and 1.1 steals.

"He is our captain. It's nice having him back, he's a great leader and does a lot of things for us on and off the floor," Henline said.

"He's one of those kids who is a coach's dream. He does a lot of little things well. He's worked on his game, too, and he's gotten bigger and stronger, too. I'm hoping he has a really good year because he's put some time into working toward it."

Six guys are looking for their second letter, including 5-9 junior guard Case Boos (7.5 pts., 2.6 asst.), 6-1 senior guard Lake Boos (7.4 pts., 2 asst.), 6-1 senior forward Andrew Arntson, 6-3 senior forward Emmet Getz, 5-9 senior point guard and shooter Jacob Limes, and 6-5 senior post Gavin DeWese.

Last year I thought we were lacking experience and this year we have a lot of experience. We return a lot of our scoring, rebounding and that kind of thing," Henline said. "We've got a lot of talent coming back and it's a matter of putting it together.

Jake Limes is pretty quick and fast, and Jake Meyer is athletic. We're actually able to play a lot of different styles, I think," Henline continued.

DeWese grew up attending Eastwood Schools but transferred to Rossford before transferring back to Eastwood for his senior year. DeWese, who contributed 6.7 points, 4.4 rebounds, one assist and half a steal per game, lettered for the Bulldogs and brings a new dynamic to Eastwood's team.

"The last couple years, Jake Meyers has been our center and we really have the luxury of having him play on the perimeter this year, which I think will benefit him with DeWese and Getz inside. Even Brady Weaver, a junior, has been doing some nice things, too," Henline said.

'Getz and DeWese inside should be something to watch, and even the Arntson kid has some good size, too. That's the nice thing this year is I have a lot of different parts that I can plug in and see what is going to work.'

Henline says he'll use the team's depth to its advantage defensively, too.

"I think you are going to see us get after people a little bit more than we have in the past because we are pretty deep. We are able to expend a lot of energy and then go to the next guy, so to speak," Henline said. There are juniors who played junior varsity last year that Henline believes will contrib-

"My juniors have put a lot of time - Brady Weaver, Noah Smith, Tristan Schuerman and Lucas Glomski — all four of them are off the JV team last year. I've seen some nice things from them, too. Practice this year should be pretty competitive," Henline said.

They include senior guard/forward Aubrey Haas, senior forwards Brenna Moenter, Kaitlyn Luidhardt and Paige Rost, and sophomore guard Kayla Buehler.

Haas was a first team All-NBC and All-District 7, second team Northwest District and honorable mention Division III All-Ohioan last year after averaging 19.2 points, 5.1 rebounds, four steals and 2.4 assists.

'Aubrey has proven herself as a legitimate scoring threat already scoring 1,000 points through three years,' coach Nick Schmeltz said. She is one of the best pure

scorers to come through Eastwood. She can find ways to score at all levels. We will continue to look for her to score but we will also count on her to rebound and battle down low at times.

Moenter, a second team All-NBC and HM District 7 selection, averaged 10 points, 8.6 rebounds, 2.6 assists, 2.9 steals and 2.9

"Brenna did a little bit of everything for us last year. At 6-foot-3 she can score and rebound but she also has great vision and anticipation that allows her to be an above average passer and good defender,"

"She protects the rim for us as well which lets our guards to be more aggressive defending on the perimeter."

Those two will lead a deep roster.

"We will be athletic and quick, as our teams have typically been, but we will also have size inside with Moenter," Schmeltz

"Having eight seniors on our roster will give us leadership and experience. Moenter's height and Haas' athleticism along with our speedier guards gives us options on defense to be versatile.

"We can full court press, play half court man, trap, play zone, and mix up looks to keep our opponents off balance. Offensively we will have a little more structure than years past and we will be in our second year of running our continuity ball screen offense. We will still look to get out and run, when possible, in transition.

Genoa's cagers looking to speed up the game's tempo

Genoa boys

Coach: Tim Hausfeld, third year, 19-24 **Last Year**: 7-16 (6-8 NBC)

Key Players: Skylar Ju, So., 6-0, G; Griffin Meyer, Jr., 5-8, G; Aiden Hemmert, Sr., 6-4, F; Andrew Szepiela, Jr., 6-3, P; Gus Trainer, Sr., 6-2, F; Will Nissen, Sr., 6-2, F

Preview: Genoa has size and athleticism, but the Comets must also replace lost production from last season.

Gone is 6-1 wing Jake Emerson, who averaged 14.3 points and 4.5 rebounds, and Trevor Wasserman, who averaged 10.4



points. Genoa gled last season, going 7-16 overall and 6-8 in the Northern Buckeve Conference.

"I know we had a rough year last year, but we were very young. I started two sophomore guards, but I think they will grow from that," said Genoa coach Tim Hausfeld. "I know the guys are excited, they're more comfortable in this style, which is chaotic, causing turnovers and leading to easy buckets on the other end. This is one of the fastest teams I've had so far, we'll look to crank it up and pressure teams. There are four different presses that we've installed. That's our brand of basketball."

Hausfeld notes that the team will play some man-to-man and could employ a 1-2-1-1 and a 2-2-1 zone.

'Our bread and butter is face-guarding and full-court press," he said. "That's probably what we do the most.'

The two returning junior guards who started last year are 6-0 Śkylar Ju, who averaged 8.2 points, and Griffin Meyer, who is 5-8 and averaged 6.1 points. There are four post players who could start, too — 6-4 senior Aiden Hemmert, 6-3 junior Andrew Szepiela, 6-2 senior Gus Trainer and 6-2 senior Will Nissen.

"The starting lineup is up for debate," said Hausfeld.

There are four wings who could see action, too — 5-9 junior Robert Messenger, 5-10 junior Mason Drummond, 5-11 senior Casey Laytart and 6-2 sophomore Aiden Brunkhorst — and 5-9 sophomore guard Jon Huston is also part of the rotation.

"I think we're trending in the right direction," Hausfeld said. "I think that our overall depth and speed really matches what we're trying to install here. We definitely have some faster players, so hopefully that makes for a little more exciting brand of basketball. We were a little slower my last two years.

"We're trying to promote moving the ball and getting points from a variety of players. I've got a good group of guards. We're looking to build a more high-tempo offense here at Genoa.

Hausfeld expects Eastwood and Ross-

ford to be among the best in the league.

The football team did make it to the second round of the playoffs, so Hausfeld believes there may be an adjustment period

for the team in the early part of the season.

Preview: With six seniors and talented players, Genoa could be in for a good season.

However, the Comets will have to replace a number of key players, notably Caitlin Cruickshank, who averaged 13.5 points and 5.9 rebounds last season. Also gone are Taylor Simmons and Olivia Wiciak.

Senior point guard Gina Goodman, who stands 5-7, averaged 8.4 points, 2.6 rebounds and 2.1 assists last season.

The other five seniors are 5-10 guard/ post Sophia Richards, 5-10 guard/post Lacy Frias, who averaged about three points per game last season, 5-10 post Alyssa Hartford and 5-6 guard Shelby Wagner.

"We think we'll have a balanced scoring attack, it should be spread out," said Genoa coach Glenn Black. "Goodman is going to be the motor that makes us go.

Two juniors — 5-5 guard/post Gabby Lopez and 5-3 guard Emily Koza — will see playing time, and 5-4 guard Molly Coleman and 5-5 guard Emersen Bickel could be in the mix, too.

'We feel confident that we're going to get a lot out of each of our kids," said Black. "As far as depth, it's maybe not as



much as we would like to have, but we are confident with the kids we do have and that we're going to get production out

of them. We've got some confidence that we have some interior play, as well as some good guards that should help us.

"I think the biggest thing is going to be ball movement, spacing and moving without the ball. Ball movement and spacing are going to be our two primary focuses. We've changed some things, the kids have been pretty receptive. They're great kids, they're adaptable, they've been willing to adjust.

We think we can get some miles out of Lacy Frias and Aly Hartford. Gabby Lopez is a utility player who will play a little bit of everywhere.

Black, who was previously the JV coach for the Woodmore boys basketball team, notes that the starting lineup will vary according to matchups.

"It will be situational, depending on who we match up with," he said. "That will likely vary from game to game.'

Black echoes the sentiments of other area coaches and sees the Northern Buckeve Conference as being very tough this season.

"I think our league is very competitive. The co-player of the year (Brooklyn Thrash) returns for Elmwood," Black said. "I think we have one of the tougher leagues in the area. I think this will be a good, competitive league. We say to bring the juice every day. We just want to give our best every day. Bring a lot of energy, play hard. That's our goal for this year. We just want to push ourselves and grow as a team."





Leading the way for Brent Liskai's club is 6-6 post Aiden McGough, who averaged 14.2 points and nine rebounds last year. He earned first-team honors in the Sandusky Bay Conference River Division last year for his

efforts. Tyler Henderson is a 5-9 guard and averaged 9.5 points last year to earn second team honors in the River Division.

Aidan Farmer is 6-4, Carter Miller is 6-2 and Tyler Schooley, who is 6-0, will complement McGough in the post. Farmer and Schooley lettered last season.

'We've got to use that size, this is one of the bigger teams I've had," said Liskai, who is the school's all-time leader in victories. "McGough and Henderson can score in many different ways. We need the guys to use their athleticism and pound the glass; we stress rebounding in practice. That will be the key — when we rebound well, we're a very good basketball team."

Drew Morelock, a 6-0 wing, lettered last year, and he'll be joined by fellow wings in 6-2 Justin Adams, 6-2 Austin Rodriguez and 5-9 Jacob Hacker.

"With the players we have, we can do multiple things," said Liskai. "With McGough and Farmer, we have good size inside. We have good shooting, we have nice length, we can play multiple ways, we're going to take each night and see how we match up with our opponent.

"I'm pleased with all of (the wings), they all bring a different skill set. We're still trying to find the lineup that plays the best together. It's good to have multiple options — some are drivers, some are better jump

shooters, and defense is what separates basketball players."

The Bears could employ a variety of looks on the defensive side of the ball.

"We're primarily a man-to-man team," Liskai said. "We mix some zone with our size, we try to do multiple things and be hard to prepare for."

The River Division is filled with a number of good teams, most notably Old Fort and Tiffin Calvert, which won a combined 40 games last year and shared the league title.

"We're in a very tough league. Old Fort and Tiffin Calvert are usually the top teams. Hopewell-Loudon, they have a nice program. It's a very good basketball league," Liskai said. 

Preview: Lake coach Joe Nowak enters his seventh season hoping to bring back the Northern Buckeye Conference trophy after a three-year absence. The Flyers won the NBC title in 2018-19 and were district champs in 2019-20. Last year, Lake finished 12-9, but Nowak has seven letter winners returning.

'With returning as many players as we do this year, and the capabilities of those players along with the players new to the varsity level, one of our strengths will likely be the ability to play 10 to 12 girls on any given night," Nowak said.

"Our guard play will likely be something we look on to get us going and carry us on some nights, but with the lineups we could potentially play with 10 to 12 girls, there are plenty of opportunities that should lead to scoring balance and the ability to really get after it."


















Northwood cagers feeling like they are at a turning point





Preview: Woodmore is coming off a good season, one that saw it win 13 games and finish 8-6 in the Northern Buckeye

But the Wildcats graduated a bevy of players and return just one letter winner in Aaron Miller.

One of the key losses was Hunter Allen, who averaged 16.2 points and 9.8 rebounds in the post.



"We definitely are low in numbers, it's the lowest numbers we've had in my eight years (coaching the Wildcats),' said Woodmore coach Aaron Clouse. "We don't have the amount of kids out that we've had in pre-

vious years.'

Miller is a 6-2 senior guard who averaged 9.3 points last season.

"He's the only player back that has experience, the rest are JV guys. He was a starter last year and was honorable mention in the NBC," said Clouse. "He will be a three-year starter for us. We're going to rely on him for his experience and leader-

ship."

There are two other seniors on the team in 5-11 forward Bryce Sandwisch and 5-9 guard/forward Duane Perkins.

A number of other players will likely see action such as Jack Everett (5-11 guard), Jon Everett (5-11 guard), Liam McCarthy (5-9 forward), Peyton Sorg (6-0 forward) and Brady Thatcher, a freshman.

"We are definitely inexperienced, with only Miller coming back. The jump from JV to varsity is a big one," said Clouse.

"A lot of teaching early, trying to get them in the right spot and what we're trying to do. It's going to be a slow process, we'll have to be patient. I definitely think we'll be better in the second half, it's going

The kids that we have, even though they haven't had experience, are working extremely hard. They've been very coachable, the practices have been very productive, and our kids are working hard. We couldn't ask for anything more effort-wise at practice."

Offensively, the Wildcats will employ a dribble-drive offense that attacks the basket and gives its players a lot of freedom.

On defense, Clouse might have to employ a zone more than he has in the past.

'We're going to have to be more flexible than we want to be," said Clouse. "Miller is our tallest kid at 6-2 or 6-3. We have to keep teams off balance and mix it up.'

"The league is going to be very good in the top half," Clouse said. "Rossford and Eastwood are going to have really good teams. Elmwood has got some good players, and they're so physical and tough. They're going to be good, too."


Preview: Woodmore had a great run over the last three years. The senior class, which was led by All-Press Player of the Year Brooke Allen, won 57 games over the last three seasons, claimed the first league title for the program in 24 years and advanced to the district finals twice.

Allen, who is the school's all-time leader in points and rebounds, is now playing at Ohio Northern University. She was joined by three fellow seniors last year in Ava Beam, Greta Bauder and Sierra Cantley.

Sophie Blausey, a 5-8 senior wing/ post, is one of the top players back along with 5-5 junior point guard Macey Bauder. Last season, Blausey averaged 8.2 points and 3.9 rebounds while Bauder put up 7.2 points and 5.2 assists.

They'll be joined in the starting lineup by 5-6 junior guard Alayna Hahn, 5-8 wing/ guard Jordan Beam and 6-1 senior post Čamryn Ivy.

'Macey handles the ball 60-70% of the time. We're working with our guards and their perimeter game, their shooting,' said Woodmore coach Kyle Clair. "Sophie has done really well so far. She's put us on her back a few times (in scrimmages). She's been scoring pretty well and rebounding it pretty well. Camryn has had some good

junior guard Paige Helmke and 6-2 junior post Mackenzie Krukemyer.

"Our bench, our rotation and our depth are developing," said Clair. "I'm expecting big things from Alayna Hahn, she has a ton of promise. Sidney Wank coming out as a senior, I think she can help us. Jordan Beam is a first-year varsity starter and Mackenzie Krukemyer is 6-1, we expect her to give us something off the bench. I'm pleased. It took a little bit for some kids to get in because of fall sports. Once we got everyone in, I like where we are, we've still got to improve."

A strong defense has been vital to the success of the program.

"We're still predominately man-toman. We do that really well. Macey, Alayna and Jordan put pressure on the ball handlers," Clair said. "We're hoping to extend (our defense) a bit, play a little more press; man-to-man is our default, that's what we'll stick with.'

Clair sees the Northern Buckeye Conference as one of the best.

"It will be competitive, just like it's been the last 2-3 years," he said. "Everyone is optimistic. If you're not ready every night, it could go either way. I think it will be highly competitive again.'


