

The Toledo Zoo, voted a top family-friendly destination and number-one zoo in the nation, boasts more than 10,000 mammals, fish, reptiles, amphibians, birds and invertebrates representing over 720 species.

Visitors from near and far come to the Toledo Zoo to stroll the scenic grounds and explore the historic WPA-era buildings. Among the Zoo's highlights are the Arctic Encounter, the Africa! exhibit, Nature's Neighborhood children's zoo, Tembo Trail, the Aquarium, the ProMedica Museum of Natural History and the Nancy L. and Martin Davidson Barnyard, an interactive exhibit where guests can meet alpacas, goats, pigs and other farm animals.

The Toledo Zoo's twin Polar bear cubs, Kallik and Kallu, recently went on exhibit in the Arctic Encounter with their mother, Crystal. The male cubs, born on Nov. 11, 2022, are Crystal's eighth and ninth cubs.

Canal Experience

Step back in time at the Canal Experience and get a taste of life on the Miami and Erie Canal in 1876. Providence Metropark is located in what was once the canal town of Providence, Ohio. Today, the Metropark has one of the greatest concentrations of canal-era features in the country, including:

- The Volunteer, a reproduction of a mule-drawn canal boat.
- The Isaac Ludwig Mill, a working water-powered saw and gristmill.
- More than a mile of the original Miami and Erie Canal and towpath.Lock #44, one of the last functioning
- 19th century limestone locks.
- Scenic Providence Dam, constructed across the Maumee River to maintain water levels in the canal.
- Characters in period attire welcoming visitors to a time gone by.
- Visit the Heritage Center to view The Volunteer and Lock 44 in action.

Oregon Jerusalem **Historical Society Brandville School**

Built in 1882, the historic Brandville School has been restored and is now part of the Oregon-Jerusalem Historical Society complex. It was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1994.

Brandville School houses artifacts from Native Americans who lived in the Great Black Swamp area. There is also a military room with artifacts from all the major conflicts in which the United States has been involved, dating from 1812 to the present.

The Carriage House includes vignettes of the old Metzger General Store, a doctor's office and an old post office. The one-room schoolhouse will take visitors back to the turn of the 20th Century.

The historical society offers a number of special events and programs throughout the year.

Beginning April 5, the museum complex is open Wednesdays from 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. for tours, research and artifact collection. Call to arrange tours for groups tours. No charge; donations accepted.

Harbor View Historical Society & Museum

Located in the historical neighborhood of Harbor View in the city of Oregon, the Harbor View Historical Society and Museum continues to attract visitors from all over the country and Canada.

The Society Complex is situated on the land originally deeded to the Ottawa chief named OTT-TO-KEE (Autokee) for his assistance to the American Forces during the War

Located nearly 100 yards outside of the Harbor View Yacht Club entrance on Autokee Street, the museum offers a glimpse of the War of 1812 and the Battle of Lake Erie

The British long gun and the American carronade on display are from the 2003 movie "Master and Commander Far side of the World," starring Russel Crowe. The cannons allow visitors to get an up-close view of the cannons that were used at the Battle of Lake Erie in 1813. Other exhibits include "The United States Navy, Toledo from 1933 to 1997," and the nearly 100-year-old Harbor View Post Office that has provided service to the small communities on Maumee Bay.

The Museum hosts many other special attractions throughout the year.

Open Wednesdays 5-9 p.m. Admission is free.

Historic Genoa

Among the many mercantile, entertaining, and historical treasures the Village of Genoa (founded in 1857) has to offer, the Historic Town Hall (built in 1883) is a must-see for a variety of reasons.

Located at 509 Main St., it is classified as the oldest free-standing municipal building in Ottawa County and is listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

Built in the Gothic revival style, the structure features eight ornamental chimneys and a hand-carved sandstone mask of Dionysius, the Greek God of theater, which rests over the main entrance. The first floor houses the mayor's office and the village council chambers; the second floor is used by Genoa Civic Theater.

Genoa Privy, built to serve as Genoa's first school, is believed to be the only brick outhouse on the National Register of Historic Places.

Elmore Depot

The Elmore Historical Society purchased 1860s Elmore Depot in 1981, along with 2.5 acres of land. The society undertook an extensive renovation, and the building now houses memorabilia from Elmore's past.

In 1983, society members dismantled, relocated and rebuilt the 1940s Heckman log cabin, adding an elaborate flagstone fireplace and porch, and furnishing it with artifacts from its era.

Schedel Arboretum & Gardens

Each year, the beauty and serenity of Schedel Arboretum & Gardens brings thousands to the 17-acre estate on the banks of the Portage River in Elmore.

The legacy of Joseph and Marie Schedel, the estate features an 1800s Manor House, upwards of 10,000 annual plants and flowers, an extensive bonsai collection and themed gardens including roses, perennials, tropicals, irises and peonies. Other highlights include a Japanese garden, two lakes, numerous water features. a working vegetable garden and a fruit tree

Schedel is also home to the Blair Museum of Lithophanes, the largest collection of the 19th-century artform in the world. The McAlear Gallery, located in the Brown Welcome Center, features art exhibits each year showcasing the works of international, national and regional artists.

Woodville Historical Museum

Woodville Historical Museum, operated by the Woodville Historical Society, features materials and artifacts documenting the rich history of the small village located on the banks of the Portage River about 20 miles east of Toledo on US 20.

Museum visitors can learn about the 1900s oil boom, Native Americans in the Woodville area, lime plants, early schools, the Lake Shore Electric rail system that once traveled between Toledo and Cleveland and

Pemberville highlights

The Pemberville Opera House is the crown jewel in properties restored and maintained by the Pemberville Historical Society. The Opera House is a "Theatre on the Second Floor." Built in 1892 and completely restored in 1999, it is one of the oldest operating opera houses in the state of Ohio. An elevator tower was added in 2016 so the theatre space is accessible to all.

The opera house is home to annual events such as "Live! In The House" a concert series, the Children's Theatre Workshop, "For the Love of Art Show" and the annual Festival of Trees.

House and One-Room School takes visitors back in time to the 19th century. Believed to be the community's oldest existing building, the Furry House was built by village founder James Pember, and eventually was home to long-time residents Jacob H. Furry and his daughter, Minnie.

Featuring unique architectural details and authentic period furnishings, the house sits adjacent to the One Room School, where Pemberville's youth learned "readin' and writin'" at the turn of the century. pembervilleoperahouse.org

Wood County Museum

Step back in time at The Wood County Historical Center and Museum.

The Museum is the site of the former County Infirmary, which operated from 1869-1971, and became a museum in 1975.

Visitors can expect a variety of educational experiences, including several exhibit rooms depicting the original uses of the building as well as a wealth of information on the significant history of Wood County and Northwest Ohio. Among exhibits are "Allure & Illusion: A Rose-Colored Romance," showcasing wedding dresses once worn by local community members; "For Comfort & Convenience," "A Clean Bill of Health: Societal Response to Disease," and "Chasing the White Rabbit: An Historical Look at American Mental Illness."

The 50-acre museum grounds, maintained by the Wood County Park District, are open to the public daily.

The center also offers a variety of special programs and events throughout the year, including historical teas, several Demonstration Days, Wood County Living History Day (Aug. 27); German American Day (Oct. 11) and more.

North Coast Veterans Museum

The North Coast Veterans Museum opened in 2004 as a tribute to those who have served in the uniformed service of the United States, especially those who have lost their lives in combat or training.

Military displays include weapons, uniforms, pictures, memorabilia, military accessories, tents and first aid from the Civil War to present.

The park also includes a Veterans' Memorial and a Public Safety Services Memorial. The memorial features a 36-foot, 7,000-pound antenna that sat atop the North Tower of the World Trade Center; black granite meditation seats and a One World Trade Center Sculpture. The pentagonal design is in honor of the U.S. Pentagon, and the design on the floor represent the Pennsylvania countryside and Flight 93. (Learn more at gibsonburgohio.org)

Hayes Presidential Library & Museums

The Rutherford B. Hayes Presidential Library and Museums is the nation's first Presidential library. It houses 19th U.S. President Rutherford B. Hayes' Victorian mansion, the museum, presidential library, tomb, and a mile of paved walking trails through his 25-acre wooded estate, known as Spiegel Grove.

Exhibits include interactive components that better tell the story of 19th U.S. President Rutherford B. Hayes and First Lady Lucy Webb Hayes. The museum now has a Presidents Gallery, which has artifacts from other U.S. Presidents and has a replica of the Resolute Desk. The original is located in the Oval Office of the White House.

The latest special exhibit, "Resolute: The Spirit of Arctic Exploration," examines the Arctic's strange, treacherous environment and profiles the adventurers who tried to tame it. The exhibit will remain on display through Monday, June 30, 2024.

HPLM also offers a number of special programs and events throughout the year including genealogy classes, outdoor Verandah Concerts in the summer, a Presidential Book Club, the Hayes Train

Green spaces

Metroparks Toledo

Metroparks Toledo preserves many of Lucas County's most unique natural areas, from the Oak Openings to the Lake Erie coastal zone. Among local parks are:

• Pearson Metropark, located at 761 Lallendorf Rd., Oregon, is one of the last remaining stands of the Great Black Swamp, a notorious forest that once blanketed much

of Northwest Ohio. The thick woods and location close to Lake Erie make Pearson a favorite stopover for a wide variety of migrating birds. Nearly 15 miles of trail in this 624-acre park provide remarkable access to the best birding anywhere. From birding to baseball to picnicking and fishing, there's something for everyone at Pearson.

Remember what life was like for those settling the Great Black Swamp in the 1860s at the Johlin Cabin, built in 1867. The cabin is part of an addition to the park's accessible from Seaman Road or the park's trail system. Known as Pearson North, this area includes an extensive wetland restoration.

- Middlegrounds Metropark, located at 111 Ottawa St. Toledo, includes a halfmile of river frontage that begins at the Anthony Wayne Bridge. The urban, 28-acre greenspace offers a 1.5-mile meandering walk/bike path and tranquil views of the Maumee River. Middlegrounds has a kayak cove with access to the river for those who bring their own boats, and a hub for the Veo Bike Share. There is also an off-leash dog area with separate fenced areas for large and small dogs.
- Glass City Metropark, located at 983 Front St., in downtown Toledo, connects East Toledo to the Maumee River and brings high-quality public greenspace, trails and programs to our riverfront. Glass City Metropark is a place to gather and celebrate as a community with adventure playgrounds, water play features, a kayak cove with an interactive boardwalk, picnic and party shelters, the Glass City Pavilion with a rooftop deck, an event lawn for up to 5,000 people, The Ribbon ice skating and roller skating trail, and the Market Hall building.
- Howard Marsh Metropark, 611 Howard Rd., in Curtice, showcases six miles of water trail for canoeing and kayaking and five miles of dike-top trails for biking

The Metropark, which was previously a working farm, is adjacent to the Metzger Marsh State Wildlife Area in a region that also includes Maumee Bay State Park, Magee Marsh State Wildlife Area and the

Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge. Together, these local, state and federal public lands are known for their concentration of songbirds, or warblers, especially during spring migration.

The quarter-mile Madewell Trail extends into a marsh, and two overlooks provide access for fishing and viewing birds. The fishery is still being established.

For the paddler, there are two rolloff docks, kayaks available to rent by the hour using smartphone app (Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day) and portages between marsh unit.

Maumee Bay State Park at Cedar Point and North Curtice roads along the Oregon-Jerusalem Township border offers 1,336 acres of not only the finest of recreational facilities in the Midwest, but also a unique natural environment created by the convergence of the land and Lake Erie.

A resort lodge and cabins, and golf course are nestled among scenic meadows, wet woods, and lush marshes. More than 300 bird species have been observed here. Families will enjoy the campground, inland lake, nature center, accessible boardwalk trail, and the Storybook Trail.

Magee Marsh Wildlife Area supports an abundance of wildlife but is probably best known as one of the top birding spots in North America for migrating songbirds, especially warblers. More than 156 species of songbirds, including 37 species of warblers, have been seen at Magee Marsh during spring and/or fall migration.

Birding at Magee Marsh can be done year-round, but the second and third week of May typically provide the most diverse numbers of songbird species for bird watchers. The most popular destination is the boardwalk bird trail, located at the end

of the wildlife area road.

At the Sportsmen's Migratory Bird Center (SMBC), visitors are greeted with numerous displays that depict the unique history, flora, and fauna of the area. Antique decoys, artifacts and photos provide a glimpse of the numerous waterfowl hunt clubs that once lined the lakeshore from Sandusky to Toledo covering about 30,000 acres. A wildlife habitat display offers visitors an understanding of what lives in a wetland.

Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge provides valuable habitat for a diversity of waterfowl and other migratory birds, resident wildlife, and endangered and threatened species.

During migration, the Refuge may host as many as 38 different species of warblers. The shrubs along the boardwalk and trails directly behind the Visitor Center provide excellent views of a variety of warblers and other migratory birds.

The Visitor Center welcomes guests

and tells the Refuge story. Friends of Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge, the 501(c)3 non-profit that supports the Refuge, operates a Nature Store in the Visitor Center. Proceeds from the store help to support the Refuge with education and restoration initiatives.

The Sandusky County Park District includes 16 parks and over, 2,500 acres, including Wolf Creek Park, Blue Heron Reserve, Creek Bend Farm and others. White Star Park, located south of Gibsonburg on SR 300, has a quarry up to 40-feet deep that is

used by scuba divers as well as for non-power boating and fishing, a beach and a campground located across from the park's main entrance. There is always something happening at the marsh

Marshes are wonderful places.

There are some people who haven't discovered the magic, who think of them as useless wastelands instead of what they really are - nature's seafood nurseries, wildlife preserves extraordinaire, economic engines attracting heavy tourism traffic, natural open spaces that improve our quality of life and excellent pollutant filters.

Preserving a marsh is all upside. We're fortunate to have saved a few choice wetlands before it was too late. Several are located virtually side-by-side in this area - Magee Marsh State Wildlife Area, Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge, Metzger Marsh State Wildlife Area, Howard Marsh Metropark, Mallard Club Marsh Wildlife Area, Cedar Point National Wildlife Refuge and portions of Maumee Bay State Park.

They are places where trees are sparse but grasses, sedges, and cattails can be luxuriant; places where the land meets water, resulting in a habitat that is uniquely both - yet it's neither, rather its own special habitat. Plants and animals that thrive in both land or water or both call it home.

For many animals, it is a place to nurture their young. Food is typically plentiful; cover is readily available.

For human visitors, it is a bustling place to witness. There is always something happening, something to be seen in the marsh. More in some seasons than others, but always something.

Onlookers have the advantage of long looks over watery vistas unburdened with tall trees. There's seemingly always something in flight, looking to feed or moving in

Birders have a special attraction to our marshes because they are so naturally rich and because they also happen to be right on a major migration flyway, and just happen to have the right stuff to host migration stopovers with wonderful accommodations for resting and refueling before making the big flight over Lake Erie.

The result is birders, naturalists, photographers, individuals and families who just plain love the outdoors converge on our marshes every year, especially around Mother's Day when the crowd favorites the warblers - are passing through in great varieties and huge numbers. We are one of the very best places in the world to enjoy the show.

And now we have a new place to visit

and enjoy the show.

A new marsh unit has been sculpted, diked, and readied for visitors at Howard Marsh Metropark - 200 additional acres of wetlands in the 1,000-acre Metropark.

Managing a wetland is not unlike being a farmer - managing invasives, water levels, access, nesting boxes and areas, all with the intent to ensure the wetland functions for many forms of life.

'Right now, we're drawing water off that unit, creating exposed open flats that shorebirds need for feeding," said Denis Franklin, who manages the marsh. "The perimeter areas are starting to be exposed, so we have some decent mud flats that are attracting shorebirds.

"We've already had reports of some visitors that birders love," he said.

Hudsonian godwits top that list right now, but there have been and will be many more species to enjoy and study. Blacknecked stilts have had nesting success

at Howard in previous years, unusual in

"We've observed the stilts moving back and forth between the marsh areas opened in 2018 and the new area, which we refer to as Phase II," Franklin said. "Sandhill cranes have also been observed. Sandhills have had a successful nest at Howard.

'The draw-down encourages some vegetation, but we have to wait and see if it's beneficial. For example, we want cattails not phragmites," he said.

Phragmites are an undesirable aggressive non-native invasive with little value to wildlife and a serious threat displacing desirable native plants.

"The vegetation will help protect our

earthen dikes from erosive wave action," Franklin said. "Every wetland is different; you have to understand the topography and your ability to move water in or out.'

In a marsh, small differences in topography can make the difference between wet or dry.

"The topography in Phase II lends itself to more open water than other units," he said. "The old Cedar Creek channel runs through this unit, and we'll never pull down levels enough to expose the channel bottom. It's an ideal blueway for kayaks

And kayaks and canoes are welcome. Those who don't own their own can rent one at the main parking area for the marsh.

Those who would rather walk are welcome on miles of trails and boardwalks that get visitors up-close-and-personal with wild-


There's so much to see, and, with the opening of Phase II, there's even more to like about Howard Marsh Metropark.

Like this.

"Over 180 species have already been observed at Howard Marsh," Franklin said. And it's only going to get better as desirable marsh vegetation takes hold and strategically placed tree plantings mature."

Lake Erie to continue historic run of excellent fishing

Lake Erie anglers can expect the 2023 fishing season to provide more world-class fishing and lasting memories, according to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) Division of Wildlife.

After another year of strong walleye hatches, Lake Erie maintains its title as the "Walleye Capital of the World." Additionally, a stable yellow perch population in Lake Erie's west zone will provide good fishing in 2023, while low catch rates are expected to continue in the central and east zones.

"Lake Erie is known worldwide as a top fishing destination," said Travis Hartman, Lake Erie Fisheries Program Administrator for the Division of Wildlife. "With many species to pursue, Lake Erie is again a high-performing destination, thanks to science-based management, which guides regulations to ensure long-term angling opportunities."

Lake Erie walleye and yellow perch fisheries are managed through an interagency quota system. Each jurisdiction regulates its catches to comply with annually determined safe harvest levels that ensure sustainability. The most recent quotas were announced March 30.

Walleye

The walleye daily limit on Lake Erie is six fish per angler with a 15-inch minimum length requirement. Walleye hatch success has been exceptional for seven of the past nine years. Anglers will mostly catch abundant 2- to 5-year-old-fish ranging from 15 to 24 inches. Larger fish from 2015 and earlier hatches will provide chances to reel in a Fish Ohio qualifying walleye (minimum 28 inches).

Abundant young fish will show up in the catch and range from 9 to 14 inches, with an increasing number of 2-year-olds reaching 15 inches as the season progresses. Anglers are encouraged to release these sub-legal fish with as little handling as possible so they can contribute to the future fishery.

"Our staff were pleasantly surprised to see the results of the 2022 walleye hatch index," Hartman said. "After another year of above-average results, we expect walleye anglers to find more high-performing fishing across the lake."

Yellow perch

Yellow perch abundance in the west zone from Toledo to Huron is increasing as a large year class of 2-year-old fish will join the population in 2023. The best success is anticipated during July through mid-August, when the water temperature is above 76 degrees, and again from mid-October through November as adult perch move to shallower water to feed at water tempera-

tures below 60 degrees. These two time periods provided a majority of angler yellow perch harvest in 2022. Abundant young perch from 7 to 9 inches will dominate the catch, with jumbo 12-inch and larger fish from older year classes also contributing to the catch.

The Lake Erie Committee sets conservative quotas each year to ensure sustainable spawning stocks that will allow the best opportunity for population recovery. Yellow perch daily limits remain as described in the 2023-24 fishing regulations through April 30, 2024, with a daily limit of 30 perch in the west zone, 10 in the central zone, and 30 in the east zone.

Bass

Smallmouth bass and largemouth bass fishing in 2023 will remain good, with the opportunity for trophy catches. The daily limit is five bass per day, with a 14-inch minimum size requirement from June 24, 2023, to April 30, 2024. During the spawning season, from May 1 to June 23, anglers may harvest one bass per day with a minimum size requirement of 18 inches.

Be alert

Erie is known for its sudden storms and pounding chop. Because it is shallow, waves can grow quickly and are often closer together than in larger, deeper waterbodies. Watch the weather carefully, check the forecasts before and during your trip and, when in doubt, head for a safe harbor.

Stay updated

The Ohio Division of Wildlife's free HuntFish OH app has all the features anglers need to enjoy a day on the water. Fishing licenses may be purchased through the app in a smooth, easy process. Multiyear and lifetime licenses are also available for purchase.

The app's map feature allows users to find boat ramps, wildlife areas, ODNR shooting ranges, license agents, and more.

Further, the app contains a weather widget, sunrise and sunset times, wind speed and forecasts, digital copies of the fishing and hunting regulations booklets, and links to Ohio state parks and boat registration information.


