## Traffic stops uncover cash, stolen credit cards

Since August, deputies of the Ottawa County Sheriff's Office have conducted several routine traffic stops in which the motorists and occupants were in possession of large amounts of cash and possibly stolen credit cards.

• On Oct. 28, a deputy initiated a stop after observing a traffic violation and smelled marijuana while approaching the vehicle.

Raw marijuana was visible on the driver's lap and a search of the vehicle uncovered \$7,000 in cash and several debit and credit cards.

The driver was also on parole in Michigan and the case is under further investigation by the sheriff's office.

• On Oct. 27, a deputy could smell alcoholic beverages from a car stopped for traffic violations. While being questioned the driver admitted there was marijuana inside the vehicle. A search of the vehicle uncovered several bags of marijuana, a bag with white residue, several debit cards that didn't belong to the three occupants of the vehicle, and \$10,760 in cash.

Dreion Adams, of Detroit; Quran Smith, Detroit, and Ariana Rogers, Oak Park, were all charged with one count of receiving stolen property.

• On Sept. 23, a deputy could smell marijuana from a vehicle stopped for traffic violations and found several bags of marijuana, a scale, plastic bags, and \$9,980 in cash.

• On Aug. 13, Malik Henderson, Detroit, was charged with one count of receiving stolen property after a deputy on patrol observed an equipment violation. Henderson also did not have the proper paperwork for the vehicle.

A search found several debit and credit cards that didn't belong to Henderson, IDs not belonging to him, and \$2,000 in counterfeit U.S. currency.

Investigations are pending in the cases, said Brad York, chief deputy.

## Oregon to rein in spending in next year's budget

As Oregon plans its budget for next year, City Administrator Mike Beazley expects to rein in spending due to the pandemic.

"Obviously, everyone knows our revenue took a substantial hit," said Beazley at a recent city council meeting. "Industries that have been important to our revenue have had some challenges. Our cash to cash income tax collection is down over \$4 million to date."

As a result of COVID-19, the city held back on spending as revenues dropped, he said.

"When the economy took some turns, we really reined in spending significantly."

The city received \$14 million in revenue for the General Fund, he said.

"But we spent only \$13 million. So we actually have taken in more than we spent. The bad news is that some of that is timing and accounting. We budgeted to spend \$22 million in the General Fund this year. And we're thinking we're going to end up spending \$19 million. So we're looking to under spend by a little over \$3 million on the General Fund side," he said.

"The city is also benefiting from good

returns on workers compensation. And some of the COVID-19 relief money from the federal government is also helping the city," said Beazley.

### Challenges

"We're doing OK," continued Beazley. "Our General Fund reserve will probably take somewhat of a hit this year. Until we get closer to the end, we won't know exactly what that is," he said. "Some of it is just the timing of project dollars and funds going out the door. We budgeted it and we plan to spend it. Our one account has sufficient reserve to afford that. We planned to spend more than we took in. The bad news,

though, is instead of getting more projects done, we're just getting less revenue. The city and council have been careful with our dollars over the years. We do anticipate challenges. We're mindful that our major industries are being hit. We're in regular conversations with them. In cutting back and pulling the reins in on spending, the mayor, administration and council have underspent by a good amount. We haven't filled vacancies, we have fewer seasonal workers, omitted some of our projects."

The city will fill some vacancies in the police department, he said.

"In general, we have a pretty good number of vacancies. We have a good number of retirements coming. We don't think it's very practical to get much smaller than we are right now. We're looking to see if we can hold the line on where we are. If more people retire, we think we will be responsible filling those vacancies. But we'll only do that in the context of the overall plan to be long term, sustainable budgeting. We think we'll have that."

He is also confident in the workforce attrition rates.

"If somehow we are wrong in our assessment, and things are worse than we think, we will have opportunities to make

that up with other attrition. We feel good about the dollars we saved," he said.

### State, federal funds

Councilman James Seaman asked if there would be any federal or state funds available after the election.

"Could there be some support coming from state or federal that's not so much directly related to COVID-19 procedures but from the tax loss that so many cities and states have lost because of low employment."

"The dollars that are coming in, we can use in a way to help us along those lines. We felt we had completed negotiations to get something that would have benefited local governments about three different times. It disappeared at the last minute. We have an opportunity to get our voices heard. I'm not expecting a lot from the state, but from the feds," said Beazley.

### Hard hit

Oregon has been particularly hit hard due to industries like BP-Husky Toledo Refinery and Toledo Refining Company, according to Beazley.

"I don't know of any other community that got hit as hard as we did because of the shape of our industries. Some of the industries that are important to us in Oregon are taking larger hits than others. Oil demand is back up to 90 percent of where it was in 2019, which is a big barometer for us. More people are driving. Demand for flights and air travel is closer to 50 percent. So those numbers affect us a lot in a community that has large industrial partners. We'll continue to work with them and with Washington. I do expect something to pass, especially with the economic uncertainty. We think there will be some stimulus. Communities that are ready and put themselves in a position to have projects ready can benefit from stimulus dollars that come. I can assure you, Oregon will be ready should there be something out there."

## The Press wins Touchstone award

The Press news staff won a Touchstone award in the non-daily news category from the Press Club of Toledo for its three-part series, "Are we saving Lake Erie?"

The Touchstone was awarded to News Editor Kelly J. Kaczala (project manager), Sports Editor and general assignment reporter J. Pat Eaken, News Editor Larry Limpf, Photojournalist Ken Grosjean, and senior projects reporter Melissa Burden for their work on the series.

The judge commented that The Press "brought so many angles to this story and probably opened a lot of eyes to a major issue."

The series is a sequel to a three-part

series, "Saving Lake Erie," which examined the Toledo water crisis that happened in August, 2014. At the time, the City of Toledo had issued a tap water ban for three days after a toxin, microcystin, was found in its water supply. A high level of microcystin, created by blue green algae, was detected in samples taken from the city's water treatment plant in East Toledo. The Press examined the causes of the toxic algae and how Northwest Ohio was dealing with the crisis. The series, published in January, 2015, also took an in-depth look at the challenges that lay ahead to restore health to Lake Erie. There was much hope that progress would be made to clean up the lake.

As we approached the fifth year anniversary of the water crisis, The Press revisited the event with "Are we saving Lake Erie?" published in the August 2019 editions of the newspaper.

in a man being sentenced to prison for 14-18 years for several felony violations.

Jody Gipson, 45, pled guilty in Ottawa County Common Pleas court to one count of aggravated possession of methamphetamine, a second degree felony; two counts of aggravated trafficking methamphetamine, a third degree felony; one count of aggravated possession of methamphetamine, a first degree felony, and violation of a protection order.

He was under investigation by the task force for about a year for trafficking in the county and throughout the state.

Gipson was indicted in June 2019 on trafficking charges, money laundering and possession of criminal tools. Investigators seized about 178 grams of methamphetamine, miscellaneous steroids and about \$3,900 in cash.

While he was on bond awaiting sentencing in the first case, task force agents conducted another investigation into Gipson and his continued trafficking. That probe led them to another 75 grams of methamphetamine, \$505 in cash and the seizure of a 2004 Mazda.

Authorities said he is from North Carolina and recently lived in the Port Clinton area.

## Water & Sewer District projects

The Northwestern Water and Sewer District (The District) delivers water and sewer services to more than 20,000 customers in Wood, Henry, Sandusky, and Hancock counties. Although many district projects are performed underground, utility work can impact roads throughout the service area.


In Northwood, through November, motorists can expect lane restrictions and water service interruptions on and near Curtice Road between Lemoyne and Bradner roads, on Chantilly Rue, Bordeaux Rue, Terri Rue and Reva Drive. Residents will be notified of service interruptions.

Lane restrictions are possible in Perrysburg Township north of SR 795, west of 75, and south of the turnpike, for sewer rehabilitation through November. The project is expected to be completed in February 2021.

Through November, lane restrictions are possible on Santus Drive, Valley Drive, and on Glenwood Road in Rossford. The closure of Glenwood between Beech Street and Santus Drive will be announced.

Crews have completed flushing all hydrants throughout The District. Work will resume next spring.

# VFW always fundraising for community, veterans

Representatives from the Greater Birmingham VFW Post 4906 found out this summer there are community members who did not know what the Veterans of Foreign Wars organization was all about.

Volunteer Tanya Koester, a member of the VFW Post 4906 Auxiliary, found that shocking, and wants to educate people.

Of course, the public welcomes VFW members when their color guard marches in the Memorial Day parade along Consaul Street, to Veterans Day ceremonies, or maybe a high school football game or other community event.

Where do you begin with an organization that has provided so much more to the East Toledo community and beyond? The fundraising activities the Birmingham post provided has benefited area schools, students, veterans, local and national nonprofits and more.

The Birmingham post has provided even more to veterans in terms of assistance, friendship, raising funds to help homeless veterans and for outreach programs.

"We're a community-based VFW. We try to help our community," said Commander Jesse Sulaica, a U.S. Army tank driver who served from 1967-69.

"It's a place for veterans to come to. Over the holidays, if they don't have a place to go, we're open seven days a week.

We want our veterans to have a place to go for holidays or what have you. They are always welcome here," Sulaica continued.

"Our vision is mainly to help veterans first, but help the community, too. Many of them are on the front line, too, and we appreciate what they do."

The Birmingham VFW has 125 veterans contributing as members and close to 300 auxiliary members. Fundraising and social activities occur throughout the calendar year. At their banquet hall on 2161 Consaul Street, The Press sat down with Sulaica and others, including Vietnam-era Air Force veteran Jim Patrilla (post trustee), Korean War-era Army veteran (Auxiliary junior vice president) Gene LaHote and Auxiliary President Tom Miller.

Last spring and summer, the Birmingham VFW continued its traditional Memorial Day poppy sales, setting up at the Oregon Farmer's Market on Navarre Avenue and the Toledo Farmer's Market on Erie Street. They also sell stars cut out from retired American flags and homemade dishwashing scrubbies, raising money for Northwest Ohio veterans.

"We also took the star out of the American flag after we burn the flags, cut it out, put our sticker on the back, and we put that out for donations with the poppies, and that went very well. There are a lot of patriotic people out there if you present it to them," LaHote said.

"My 91-year-old friend, and her husband is a veteran from Dunberger (American Legion) Post, and she makes scrubbies, so

my wife donated a bunch of scrubbies for a donation. That was a charity for us and that went over real well," LaHote continued.

Last week, the Birmingham VFW held its Trunk or Treat, handing out candy to children who could not walk through the community because of the coronavirus pandemic. VFW members say the drive-through event was a huge success.

There is a reason why the veterans and auxiliary members care about this community.

"Most of us are from this area, and many of us grew up in Birmingham here so we come back to our neighborhood. We do

what we can here," Sulaica said.

This Friday, Nov. 13 at 4 p.m. the Birmingham post will hold its Lake Erie Perch dinner, carried over because it was canceled during Lent because of the pandemic. For \$12, a perch or shrimp dinner is available, including cole slaw and French fries with limited seating (take-out available) until sold out.

In recent years, the VFW and auxiliary have held a fundraising golf outing at Eagle's Landing Golf Course on Bayshore Road, raising money for multiple causes.



# Middle-East era vets VFW can be big help

Membership at the Greater Birmingham VFW Post 4906 remains strong at 125 veterans and 300 auxiliary members.

Inside their banquet hall on Consaul Street in East Toledo's historic Birmingham neighborhood, the post displays a memory case. Inside are flags and medals donated by the families of past members who have fallen, charter photos, and pictures from the opening of the new Glass City Skyway Interstate 280 bridge that the VFW was a part of.

However, there is an active attempt to recruit veterans who served over the last three decades-plus while the United States was involved in Middle East conflicts.

"We're trying to recruit younger veterans and would love to have younger veterans come in and join us. Right now, we are mostly Vietnam-era veterans, and most of us are up in the 70s, so we would love to have newer veterans and hopefully they could carry us further. A lot of VFWs are in the same position, their members are dwindling as we get older and numbers are dropping off," said Birmingham Post Commander Jesse Suraica, a Vietnam-era veteran who served in Germany.

"We've been here for most of our lives, but it's just a generation-gap if you will. The younger generation just has different ideas than what is actually established as a VFW. What happens, too, is a lot of your younger veterans have families and have jobs. We try to look at that aspect of it as well — many of them don't have time because of jobs and all that."

For the younger veterans, the VFW can provide assistance on obtaining benefits from the Department of Veterans Affairs by calling 419-698-4411.

Birmingham Post member Gena LaHote, a Korean War-era Army who is also the auxiliary's vice president, for 20 years drove a van taking veterans from the Toledo VA Outpatient Clinic to the VA Medical Center in Ann Arbor.

"I want to tell you the organizations, the American Legion, the VFW have done so much for veterans. I'll grant you the VA is good to give them medical care, but they need a little bit more than medical care and subsidizing them. The Legion and the VFW have done great for them," LaHote said.

The Birmingham VFW has banquet facilities for fundraising, social engagements, and can arrange to host in-house funeral services for veterans. Plus, if a veteran needs an ear, the VFW is a good place to go.

"A lot of veterans don't talk about the war. There are a lot of atrocities that occur during war," Suraica said. "You want to forget them, but you can't. They can release because they have fellow veterans here who can appreciate what they've been through."

One of the Birmingham VFW members says whether its World War II, Korea, or Vietnam, "each war is different and has created a different breed of soldier."

"They appreciated the VFW. They got together and they talked about it among themselves, where they didn't tell their family or their wives, or their kids. I think that is why you don't have the membership today like you did back in World War II," he said.

"My brother was in the Navy and his ship got sunk over at Algiers, and the only way I knew his ship sunk was that he came home and got rope burns. After he went back, I asked my mother what happened and she told me, but he didn't tell me. They didn't talk about things."

The Post 4906 veterans believe it can be the same for those who served during the more modern conflicts. The same has been heard from VFWs and American Legion posts in Oregon, Walbridge, Genoa and Elmore, too. Some, like VFW Post 2510 on Second Street in East Toledo, have already closed.

"We discussed that the other day — the charter members who started this after World War II are now gone. Now, Vietnam era veterans have taken over but now we are dwindling so we need younger veterans to take over where we leave off," Suraica said.



## Freedom Twp. Levy passes, building plans proceed

One of the first things Kent Schuerman did the morning after the election was contact the office of the Wood County treasurer, Jane Spoerl.

She was expecting the call, Spoerl told the Freedom Township trustee.

Voters in the township approved a 1.75-mill, 10-year property tax that will be used to fund the construction of a new office/maintenance building.

The additional millage will generate approximately \$132,000 annually and cost the owner of a home with a market value of \$100,000 about \$61.25 a year.

Under an arrangement permitted by Ohio Revised Code, the township and treasurer's office would work with a bond company, Spoerl said, with the treasurer purchasing the bond for a specific amount, rate and terms.

The ballot issue passed by a vote of 807-for to 748-against, according to unofficial results.

"I was optimistic," Schuerman said. "We had heard from a fair amount of people who said they were in favor of it. We didn't have a lot of negative response. Still, it's a big ask for some people."

The trustees say frequent flooding along the Portage River and the damage it's done to the current township office and maintenance facility on Water Street have

prompted them to seek an alternative site for a new building.

The office building has flooded so often there is a problem with mold, Schuerman said. Six to eight feet of water in the basement when the river rises isn't uncommon.

The township rents barns a safe distance away from the river to store road salt, vehicles and equipment, shuffling between them as the seasons change.

The trustees have purchased a five-acre parcel along State Rt. 105 where a new building will be located. Preliminary cost estimates for a new structure are around \$800,000.

Schuerman said the board of trustees is cautiously optimistic the debt can be retired before 10 years.

Voters in the township also overwhelmingly approved two renewal levies; both are for fire and emergency medical services: a 3-mill, 3-year levy and a 1-mill, 5-year levy.

## 2 plead guilty in bribery case

Two men have pled guilty in the corruption and bribery case involving FirstEnergy Corp. and a scheme to pass a bill in the state legislature that bails out two financially failing nuclear power plants operated by a subsidiary of the company.

Jeffrey Longstreth, 44, and Juan Cespedes, 41, of Columbus, have each pleaded guilty to participating in a racketeering conspiracy involving more than \$60 million paid to a 501(c)(4) entity to pass House Bill 6 that allocated billions of dollars to the power plants.

Longstreth and Cespedes are two of five persons, including Larry Householder, the former speaker of the Ohio House of Representatives, charged in a criminal complaint and indicted by a federal grand jury in July.

Charging documents allege Householder, 61, Glenford, Oh., Matthew Borges, 48, of Bexley, Oh., Neil Clark, 67, Columbus, Longstreth and Cespedes conspired to violate racketeering statutes through wire fraud, receipt of millions of dollars in bribes and money laundering. Generation Now, the 501(c)(4) entity, was also charged.

According to court documents, from March 2017 to March 2020, millions of dollars were funneled to Householder and others in exchange for their help in passing HB 6.

The defendants then also allegedly worked to ensure the bill went into effect by helping to defeat a ballot initiative that would have given voters a chance to overturn the legislation.

According to the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Southern District of Ohio, Longstreth has admitted to organizing Generation Now for Householder, knowing the entity would be used to receive bribe money to further Householder's bid to become House speaker. Longstreth managed Generation Now bank accounts and engaged in financial transactions to conceal the energy company was a funding source.

Cespedes has also pled guilty and admitted he orchestrated payments to Generation Now, knowing the payments were meant to help Householder achieve political goals and, in return, help pass the bill.

As charged in this case, the racketeering conspiracy complaint is punishable by up to 20 years in prison.

### CEO terminated

FirstEnergy last month announced it was terminating three executives.

The Independent Review Committee of the company's board of directors said a "leadership transition," including the termination of Chief Executive Officer, Charles E. Jones, was effective immediately.

The Senior Vice President of Product Development, Marketing, and Branding and Senior Vice President of External Affairs were also let go.

During the company's internal review related to the government investigations, the review committee determined the executives violated FirstEnergy policies and its code of conduct.

Steven E. Strah, President of FirstEnergy, has been appointed Acting Chief Executive Officer.

# A 40-year-old law continues to produce new jobs today

This fall, tens of millions of Americans will get vaccinated against influenza -- but they won't all experience a prick in the arm. Instead, many will take FluMist, the painless nasal flu vaccine.

FluMist is just one of many breakthrough innovations that originated at the University of Michigan, where I served as Managing Director of Licensing within the Office of Tech Transfer for over a decade. I now serve as Executive Director of Duke University's Office of Licensing & Ventures which has a similar portfolio of innovations including Krystexxa, a treatment for refractory gout.

Over my many years at three universities, I've seen countless, life-changing discoveries come out of university research labs, the majority of them resulting from federal funding. But these research discoveries would have never made it off of college campuses if it weren't for bipartisan legislation passed 40 years ago -- the Bayh-Dole Act.

The Bayh-Dole Act enables universi-

ties, non-profits, and other publicly-funded institutions to patent their discoveries -- and license those patents to private companies. Before it became law, the government retained the patents on all taxpayer-funded research. Much of it never saw the light of day.

Bayh-Dole is based on a simple insight: Universities excel at basic research, but they lack the resources and expertise to turn those discoveries into functioning products. Private companies, on the other hand, are willing to take big risks -- but they're not well suited to perform extremely early-stage research.

The law's architects, Senators Birch Bayh (D-IN) and Bob Dole (R-KS), realized that it's far more efficient for universities to

partner with the private sector to further develop and commercialize new inventions.

By harnessing the creativity of research institutions alongside the capital and innovative know-how of the private sector, Bayh-Dole has fueled decades of job-creation and entrepreneurship. Since 1996, the practice of licensing academic inventions to the private sector has supported up to 5.9 million jobs and generated up to \$1.7 trillion in economic output. Bayh-Dole is also responsible for some 13,000 start-ups, by one estimate.

The law has also been a boon for American workers. It has created new positions at startups and existing companies that license university technologies. Economists are quick to point out these opportunities, but sometimes overlook an entirely new profession spurred by Bayh-Dole: my own, that of technology transfer specialist.

I've worked in the tech transfer field for over three decades, helping university researchers license their discoveries to the private sector. However, when I was in college and graduate school, the

tech transfer profession didn't even exist.

Now universities employ thousands of professionals like me and the tech transfer profession, and related careers, is poised to grow in the years ahead. In fact, many top universities, including Duke, offer technology-transfer fellowships for graduate students to provide them with on-the-job experience in this burgeoning field.

The Bayh-Dole Act also fosters a vibrant biopharmaceutical sector that directly employs over 800,000 Americans while supporting more than 4 million jobs indirectly. Direct biopharmaceutical industry jobs, on average, pay twice as much as other private sector jobs.

At a time when our country needs economic dynamism more than ever, we should do everything in our power to encourage risk-taking and innovation. Thankfully, the Bayh-Dole Act exists to help us do just that. And, I for one, am thankful for a wonderfully fulfilling career that I might not have had otherwise.

Clinic reminds area residents that the flu vaccine remains the best way to protect yourself and your loved ones from contracting a severe case of the flu.

The flu vaccine takes about two weeks to provide full protection as your body creates antibodies. A vaccine combined with regular handwashing and avoiding touching your face will help reduce the spread of flu.

Flu vaccines are recommended for everyone over the age of 6 months. However, consult your primary care physician with any questions or concerns.

Flu vaccines cannot cause you to contract the flu virus. Some people may experience side effects after getting a flu shot, such as soreness, headache, fever, nausea, fatigue or muscle aches.

While flu vaccines will not reduce your risk of contracting COVID-19, it will help you avoid getting COVID-19 and the flu at the same time.

Different viruses cause flu and COVID-19, however, they have similar symptoms, including fever, cough, breathing difficulties and fatigue. Also, some people, including those who are older and those suffering from other medical conditions, have a greater risk of developing complications from both a flu infection and COVID-19.

Handwashing, physical distancing and mask-wearing help reduce the spread of both flu and COVID-19.

Stickrath and Colonel Richard S. Fambro, Patrol superintendent. He also presented certificates of recognition signed by Colonel Fambro to Edward and Levi, who stopped following the crash and assisted King from getting out of her vehicle after it caught fire.

"Kelly is a living testimony to the effectiveness of safety belts and an example of why everyone needs to buckle up every trip, every time," said Lt. Matthew Meredith, Fremont Post commander. "Edward and Levi's bravery should be commended."

Data from 2019 shows 457 people in Ohio were killed in traffic crashes where a safety belt was available, but not in use.

The "Saved by the Belt Club" is a joint effort by the Ohio Department of Public Safety and law enforcement agencies. This club is designed to recognize people who have benefited from their decision to wear safety belts.

## **Quick turnaround for mobile testing in Oregon schools**

The Oregon City Schools (OCS) district recently finalized a partnership with Mercy Health and the Toledo Lucas County Health Department to use the Mercy Health Mobile COVID Testing Team to support the students and staff in the district.

"We are very excited and blessed to have this partnership," said Superintendent Hal Gregory.

In a supportive response to the district's restart plan, the formal partnership with Mercy Health has expanded to assist the school system with quick and responsive COVID testing.

"As we bring the majority of our students back to school, Mercy Health has committed to activate their Mobile COVID Testing Team to complete needed COVID testing to any student or staff member of Oregon City Schools," said Gregory. "The Toledo Lucas County Health Department

has committed to providing testing kits to Mercy Health."

"Mercy Health is committed to providing health care solutions to everyone in the community," said Bob Baxter, Mercy Health – Toledo market president. "In discussions with the Oregon City School District, it became apparent that they were in need of an immediate testing solution to safely implement its return-to-school plan. Mercy Health is excited to provide the solution that will ensure the safe return of our community's most valuable assets, our children."

### ***Mobile team***

How does it work?

A referral would be made by OCS to Mercy Health, explained Gregory. Mercy Health will contact the family or staff member upon being notified by OCS.

"In most cases, this will occur the same day," said Gregory. Mercy Health will schedule a time for their Mobile Team to come out to a person's home to administer

a COVID test. In most cases, this will also occur the same day. Testing results may come back in 24 hours."

Students or staff who exhibit virus symptoms will qualify.

"The referral will come directly from our OCS school nurse and Mercy Health Nurse Practitioner Cherie Sexton.

"The goal is to respond quickly to each situation to limit the amount of time students and staff are quarantined. Keeping students coming to school... continues to be our priority."

### ***Streamline***

He thanked Mercy Health and the health department for their willingness to

streamline the testing process and help the community stay safe and educated, he said.

"This process is a major component for potentially keeping our schools open and students safe as the virus continues to spread," he said.

Mercy Health reminded the community that the best way to reduce the spread of COVID-19 is through proper mask wearing, proper hand hygiene and maintaining social distancing. Also, although flu vaccines will not reduce your risk of contracting COVID-19, it will help you avoid getting COVID-19 and the flu at the same time.

# My child is sick...what if it's coronavirus?

The fall weather heralds in a whole host of recurring viruses and illnesses for our children and ourselves to be exposed to. In the midst of a worldwide pandemic, what's a parent to do?

First of all, let's take a deep breath. COVID-19 is an illness that generally only causes serious concerns for about 10% of children. Most children will present with mild symptoms (e.g., cough, body aches, fevers, fatigue, sore throat, runny noses) that may be indistinguishable from other illnesses.

People at high risk for serious COVID-19 infections are the elderly and those with serious diseases that cause weakened immune systems or have chronic concerns with their lungs or heart.

#### What is a true exposure to COVID-19?

If you or your child has spent more than 15 minutes with a person who is positive for COVID-19 and you were within 6 feet of distance during that 15 minutes, your child has had an exposure. (Learn more about close contact and exposure from the Centers for Disease Prevention and Control.)

**How do I know if my child has COVID-19?**

You may not. Remember, the most important thing is to treat the symptoms that your child has and make sure you are watching for symptoms that would indicate that they would need to seek a higher level of care. Stay in good communication with your child's doctor for specific advice for your child. They may recommend that your child be seen for an office visit or be seen at an urgent care.

Look for emergency warning signs for COVID-19. If someone is showing any of these signs, seek emergency medical care immediately (call 911 or go to the emergency room):

- Trouble breathing (increase in work of breathing, rapid or fast breathing).
- Persistent pain or pressure in the chest.
- New confusion.
- Inability to wake or stay awake.
- Bluish lips or face.

#### What do I do if my child's sick?

Unless your child has symptoms that re-

quire a higher level of care, stay home. The Centers for Disease Prevention and Control (CDC) recommends that when people are sick, they need to stay home to prevent the spread of all diseases to others.

How long someone can spread the virus that causes COVID-19 is still under investigation. It's possible for people to spread the virus for about two days before experiencing signs or symptoms and remain contagious for at least 10 days after signs or symptoms first appeared. So, in general, once you notice symptoms of illness, you should isolate for 10 days after those symptoms to help prevent the spread.

Remember that even if your child is asymptomatic, they could be contagious if they have COVID-19. So, it's important to quarantine and avoid contact with others if they've been exposed to COVID-19.

#### How can I reduce my child's chance

#### of getting COVID-19?

Prevention of illness is the key. Remind your child to keep social distance, wash their hands frequently and keep their face covered as recommended. Be sure to clean and disinfect "high touch" surfaces daily. This helps prevent the spread of many of our illnesses including influenza and COVID-19. Make sure to get your seasonal flu shot to help decrease your risk of catching the flu. Flu shots should be given to all people over 6 months of age.

## Flu vaccine, blood donation both save lives

The American Red Cross is urging healthy donors of all blood types to give blood or platelets to ensure a strong blood supply for patients as the U.S. braces for flu season while in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Medical experts are urging people to get the flu shot to avoid a flu epidemic on top of the current COVID-19 pandemic. Because blood can only be given by those who are feeling well, a severe flu season could create additional challenges to maintaining a sufficient blood supply for hospital patients in need.

Getting a flu shot doesn't affect blood donation eligibility. There is no waiting period to give blood or platelets after receiving a flu shot as long as the donor is symptom-free and fever-free. There is no risk of transmitting the influenza virus after receiving a flu vaccination.

For those that have the flu, it is important to wait until they no longer exhibit flu symptoms, have recovered completely and feel well before attempting to donate. Donors must feel healthy and well on the day of donation.

Make an appointment to donate blood by downloading the Red Cross Blood Donor App, visiting RedCrossBlood.org, calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) or enabling the Blood Donor Skill on any Alexa Echo device.

In gratitude for making time to donate, the Red Cross will send those who donate through Wednesday, Nov. 11 a \$5 Amazon.com Gift Card via email, courtesy of Suburban Propane.

### COVID-19 info for donors

The Red Cross is testing blood, platelet and plasma donations for COVID-19 antibodies. The test may indicate if the donor's immune system has produced antibodies to the coronavirus, regardless of whether an individual developed COVID-19 symptoms.

Red Cross antibody tests will be helpful to identify individuals who have COVID-19 antibodies and may now help current coronavirus patients in need of convalescent plasma transfusions. Convalescent plasma is a type of blood donation collected from COVID-19 survivors that have antibodies that may help patients who are actively fighting the virus.

COVID-19 antibody test results will be available within one to two weeks in the Red Cross Blood Donor App or donor portal at RedCrossBlood.org. A positive antibody test result does not confirm infection or immunity. The Red Cross is not testing donors to diagnose illness, referred to as a diagnostic test. To protect the health and safety of Red Cross staff and donors, it is important that individuals who do not feel well or believe they may be ill with COVID-19 postpone donation.

Each Red Cross blood drive and donation center follows safety and infection control protocols including temperature checks, social distancing and face coverings for donors and staff.

Donors are asked to schedule an appointment prior to arriving for blood donation.



# Woodmore harriers getting back to the bigger stage

Woodmore senior Ava Beam finished seventh at the Division III regional cross country meet, propelling the Wildcats to a fourth place team finish and qualifying them for the state girls meet for the second straight year.

Woodmore coach Lacy Seamans said her girls were in high spirits heading into the state meet.

"It went really well on Saturday. They are excited. Our last practice was on Friday and they had a theme to dress up and we are just trying to keep it loose," Seamans said. "They definitely have their eyes on the prize and they'd love to take that victory lap. They have some goals that they want to hit. So, we're going to keep the volume up, but with just a couple light workouts and hopefully can hit it on Saturday."

In addition, Woodmore junior C.J. Buchanan finished 14th in 16:52.5, good enough to qualify him as an individual for the D-III state boys meet.

"This week, we cut him down a little bit. We do not want to take too many miles out of his routine because they tend to get little bit flat if he does that — just a couple more workouts. C.J. rides his bike a lot so that will remain part of his program and he delivers papers — that definitely helps the cardiovascular."

The state meet was held Saturday at Fortress Obetz in Obetz, Ohio, just south of Columbus.

"It looks like a couple loops — it looks a little like the National Trails course where they kind of repeat an area over and over again. It is kind of fan friendly but I am not sure if it will be the kids' favorite course or not," said Seamans, adding that she is told it is a flat course, which might have been favorable to Northwest Ohio runners.

The Woodmore cross country program, once a state perennial small school power, is getting so good once again that Seamans has begun researching the history of the program online and is getting plenty of feedback.

"We have a Facebook page that a couple years back I was trying to compile some of the top times for Woodmore, because that was something that we were keeping track of," Seamans said.

"We are still missing some of that in there, but since we started the project a lot of the alumni became active on that page. They're cheering on the kids, and when (former Woodmore record holder) Montana (Garcia), he's coaching at Lake saw that, he sees a lot of what C.J. is doing and on the girls side, it's 'Hey, if any of the girls want to break our records, let us know, we'd re-

ally love to come and see that."

The Woodmore girls cross country team won three straight state championships from 1992-94, finished second in 1995 and 1999 and also qualified for state in 1982, 1986, 1987, 1988, 1996, 1997, 1998, 2000 and 2007.

In 1992, the Wildcats scored 114 points to finish ahead of state runner-up Chagrin Falls (127) in D-II, and in 1993, the Wildcats scored 76 to finish ahead of Peninsula Woodridge (115). In 1994, the Woodmore girls scored 75 points to finish ahead of Liberty-Benton (99) in the first year the D-III race was held. In 1995, Woodridge defeated Woodmore 69-94 to claim the state title, and in 1999, the 'Cats were edged out by Minster, 104-107.

In 1976, the Woodmore boys team finished as Class A state runners-up, scoring 94 points to finish behind West Liberty-Salem (55). The Woodmore boys also qualified for state in 1977, 1985, 1999 and 2001.

#### Ava Beam has good run

In this year's regional at Tiffin's Hedges Boyer Park, Beam, last year's Alan Miller

Jewelers All-Press Runner of the Year, finished in 19:26.6 as the Wildcats scored 208 points to finish behind Liberty Center (46), Minster (54) and Fort Recovery (204).

One week earlier at the district meet, Buchanan finished sixth in 17:19.93, but Seamans thought both tournament runs were not his best appearances and is confident he would do better at state.

"Actually, the last couple weeks he has been a little bit disappointed," Seamans said. "Districts, he fell in the very first turn — he had a wipeout in the mud and wasn't really able to get back in the race (lead pack), but got far enough to survive and make it to the next week. I think it just shook him up a bit."

"Regionals, it was just another case of after not having people around him all season, he got bumped around a little bit, but again, he advanced and he's got another week to prepare for what I hear is a really fast course (at state)."

For the girls team at regionals, sophomore Olivia Vogelpohl (19:54.1) was 17th, senior Olivia Thatcher (20:52.5) was 44th, freshman Emma Hammer (21:41.6) was

83rd, freshman Madi Hammer (22:13) was 111th, junior Kristen Davis (22:16.1) was 114th and freshman Kylie Cordie (23:52) was 151st out of 178 competitors.

"The girls dealt with the same thing — the Tiffin course was a little bit slower than it normally runs because it was wet. It was a little better in the morning when we got there about the time the races took off because it had melted. The course was a little bit sloppy," Seamans said.

"The Hammer girls both PR'd (personal record) on the fourth and fifth position, and for the fourth and fifth week in a row our fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh runners all finished in different order again which is really a strength for us that any of those girls can step up on any day and take over depending on whoever is feeling good."

At the district meet, Woodmore finished second, scoring 71 points to finish behind champion Liberty Center (29). Beam (19:31.2) was fourth, Vogelpohl (19:53.85) eighth, Thatcher (20:37.17) 13th, Emma Hammer (21:43.96) 20th, Davis (22:04.05) 26th, Madi Hammer (22:28.3) 31st and Cordy (23:18.59) 43rd out of 93 runners.

# Eastwood had to be physical to reach regional finals

Richwood North Union traveled over two hours to Eastwood's Freedom Field, bringing with them a reputation for playing physical football.

The Eagles met the challenge as 5-foot-11, 215-pound senior running back Gage Might scored from four yards out in overtime to give Eastwood a 20-14 Division V regional semifinal victory over the Wildcats.

Eastwood coach Craig Rutherford says it was a "wild game" with a strange finish. The Eagles stopped the Wildcats in their first overtime possession, putting Rutherford's team in a good spot. If they had to, they could rely on senior kicker Connor Oberhouse, who has kicked three field goals and converted on 33 extra points.

"It was a tough, respectful game," Rutherford said. "Obviously, when you win the coin toss before overtime that is an advantage. We felt good. We thought that he (Oberhouse) could have made it right away, but obviously we tried to get the touchdown. It was a fun way to end it."

First, the Eagles had to stop the Wildcats. Rutherford is giving a lot of credit to his linebackers, who are stepping up to make plays against good teams.

Outside linebackers are 5-10, 161-pound senior Isaac Badenhop and 5-11, 171-pound junior Dylan Hoffman. Inside linebackers are 5-8, 174-pound sophomore Bryce Hesselbart and 5-6, 171-pound senior Zach Kwiatkowski.

"Dylan came up with a big tackle for a loss in overtime and our secondary played well. We got a pass interference call, but we were being aggressive which we are OK with," Rutherford said. "You have to compete with those guys. Then, we were able to get pressure on the quarterback when we needed it and that made the difference in the end."

North Union was facing a fourth down and 16, but the pass interference call moved the Wildcats up to the 3-yard line. However, Rutherford said the North Union coaching staff was arguing with the offi-

cials and their team was whistled a delay of game penalty, setting the Wildcats back to the 8-yard line. An ensuing field goal attempt fell short.

North Union opened a 14-7 halftime lead, but Eastwood held them scoreless in the second half.

"We sustained our blocks. We looked at what they were doing and tried to make a couple adjustments and see if we could get anything to hit, and got after the ball a little bit, and it worked," Rutherford said.

"Their running back (5-11, 200-pound senior Trevor Moran), was pretty tough. He runs hard. We had trouble slowing him down early. Their receiver (senior Trevyn Feasel) just made some really amazing catches, and it's a good combination for them. We were fortunate to have some guys

in the right place at the right time late in the fourth quarter and in overtime, and it worked out."

North Union stifled Eastwood's offense, too, as 5-8, 155-pound sophomore running back Bryce Koprowski-Kistner was the Eagles' leading back with 81 yards on 22 carries. On the season, Koprowski-Kistner has 874 yards on 166 carries, caught six passes for 139 yards and scored 10 touchdowns.

Emmet Getz, a 6-2, 218-pound junior back, has 382 yards on 74 carries and scored six TDs. Might has 325 yards rushing on 41 carries and scored six TDs and 5-7, 165-pound junior back Ethan Kwiatkowski has 226 yards on 41 carries.

Eastwood 5-10, 182-pound senior quarterback Jared McNulty has completed 31 of 49 passes (63.3 percent) for 458 yards

and six TDs, and 6-1, 218-pound junior split end Andrew Arntson has nine catches for 151 yards and four TDs.

North Union, which fell to 7-3, had beaten Fostoria (48-0), Genoa (35-7) and Liberty-Benton (28-7) to get to Eastwood. Eastwood is 7-1 and traveled to Tontogany Saturday for a rematch with Otsego (9-0) in a regional final showdown. Otsego is the only team to defeat the Eagles, 17-7 on Sept. 4.

A win would send Eastwood into the D-V state semifinals for the first time since 2017, when the Eagles (14-1) were state runners-up, losing to Wheelersburg, 21-14, in overtime at Canton's Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium. That was Craig Rutherford's first year at the helm, taking over for his father, long time coach Jerry Rutherford, who is helping out this year as an assistant.

# Eagles' linebacker corps builds confidence

Eastwood football coach Craig Rutherford says a big reason for Eastwood's seven-game winning streak is the linebackers, who seem to be building confidence with every game.

They are not the biggest linebackers, but that have what it takes. Outside linebackers are 5-10, 161-pound senior Isaac Badenhop and 5-11, 171-pound junior Dylan Hoffman. Inside linebackers are 5-8, 174-pound sophomore Bryce Hesselbart and 5-6, 171-pound senior Zach Kwiatkowski.

Kwiatkowski leads the team with 81 tackles (56 solo, 25 assists), nine tackles for a loss, two sacks, and two recovered fumbles. Of the four, he was the one who came into the season experienced.

"They are our most inexperienced group, other than Zach, who was a second team all-state player for us a year ago and a three-year starter," Rutherford said. "So, he has been the rock of our defense for a long time."

This year, Rutherford brought in linebacker coach Evan Karchner, a 2012 Maumee High School graduate who played for coach John Boles when the Panthers last had a successful gridiron run in the Northern Lakes League. Karchner went on to play NCAA Division I football at Bowling Green State University.

"(Karchner) has had to find ways to get those guys reps in practice. Isaac Badenhop, he moved down from corner (back) and he was an all-league corner a year ago," Rutherford said. "Because we needed depth at linebacker, he moved down. He has grown up a little bit, spent a lot of time in the weight room and he's one of our leading tacklers. He is a basketball and baseball player, so he's fairly aware.

"Dylan Hoffman has been one of our guys all year, but he made some unbelievable tackles for a loss that really got North Union out of what they wanted to do. He went flying in there and really disrupted things. It seems like it actually surprised him a little bit that he made those plays, but we could see him growing as a player just throughout the game and he's become a nice player for us."

That is what Karchner likes to see — his linebackers making big plays, like two huge tackles for a loss from Hoffman, including the one in overtime, in the 2014 Division V regional semifinal overtime win over Richwood North Union.

"That was really big for him because this year was his first year starting and getting varsity action," Karchner said. "Any big plays those young kids can make is great for their confidence and it's awesome watching them when they do make big plays and are getting confidence, how much they grow from week to week."

"It's a special thing to see and it's one of the things I love about coaching, and one of the things I love about coaching kids from Eastwood because they work so hard you want to see them do things. When they do stuff like that in big situations, like in that game versus North Union, it will be talked about forever. That does wonders for those kids."

Badenhop have almost been like second coaches in helping him teach the two less-experienced linebackers.

"I got a lot of help with Bryce from Zach. They spend a lot of time together and Bryce does a lot of learning from Zach. One of the things that I pride myself on is I do really well with teaching the basics, the simple things of linebackers that a lot of people don't think about to help them become better defensive players, not just linebackers," Karchner said.

"So, with Dylan and Bryce I had the opportunity to work with them at the beginning of the year because they don't play in the offense, so I got a lot of time with them. So, that's basically my philosophy — 'Hey, we are going to do the little things better than everybody else.' They are things you might not think about, and maybe things that are not the flashiest to work on. Those two did a great job of buying into that and buying into me."

"You know, I was a new coach at Eastwood, and they had no clue who I was, and part of the battle is winning over the kids and having them trust you. I'm really grateful that Craig runs a great program and has great kids and players, and they really welcomed me, and those young kids made my job a thousand times easier and made it fun to coach them," Karchner continued.

"Really, all their success should go to them because they work their butts off every single day when they step on that field. They really make me proud to say I am part of that."

Hesselbart is second on the team with 51 tackles (40 solo, 11 assists), including six for a loss. Badenhop follows with 39 tackles (33 solo, six assists), three for a loss, two sacks and one caused fumble. Hoffman has 21 tackles (19 solo, two assists), including four for a loss and one sack.

Karchner did coach the Eastwood linebackers in 2015, his first year out of college,

and then returned this year.

"I knew Eastwood was a special place and I coached linebackers then. I know my reason why I worked back to Eastwood was because it is a special place with special coaches. There are really good kids to work with so it's a blast working with those kids. They are all tough-nosed kids, work really hard and they make my job really easy," Karchner said.

This year, it has been about more than just what happens on the football field.

"Zach and Isaac both played a lot of varsity games for Eastwood, they have won a lot of games, and they have a lot of experience. They've done a great job this year leading our team and being leaders of our defense, especially with everything going on with how COVID is and all the game cancellations, and all of the hoops we have to jump through and all the guidelines we have to follow, they've done a great job sort of keeping everybody focused, everybody in line on our goals," Karchner said.

"Even though we might have some games canceled and guys might get COVID all this stuff, they really helped our team and especially our defense stay focused on what we wanted to do."

Leading Eastwood's defensive line is Blake Landis, a 6-2, 197-pound senior, who has 38 tackles (33 solo, five assists), including 18 for a loss, 10 sacks, one caused fumble and one recovered fumble. Junior Cole Kiefer, a 5-11, 237-pound junior DL, has 26 tackles (18 solo, eight assists), six for a loss, two sacks, caused one fumble and recovered one fumble.

Leading the defensive backfield is 6-0, 165-pound junior Lake Boos, who has 22 tackles (21 solo, one assist) and 5-8, 138-pound sophomore Case Boos has 22 tackles (19 solo, three assists) and one tackle for a loss. Isaac Cherry, a 5-10, 146-pound junior, has 20 tackles (17 solo, three assists).

## Waite's Heslet, Peacock get City League top honors

Waite football swept the Toledo City League awards, with first-year coach Aaron Peacock getting Coach of the Year honors and 6-foot-2, 165-pound senior quarterback Nik Heslet earning Player of the Year honors.

The Indians finished the regular season 4-1 and were the No. 2 seed in the City League final four, taking on Woodward Thursday at Rogers. No. 1 seed Start took on No. 4 seed Rogers in the other semifinal. The winners will meet this Thursday, Nov. 12 at Bowsher, kickoff at 6 p.m.

Heslet, the TCL first team quarterback, has completed 41 of 73 of his passes (56.2 percent) for 556 yards and four touchdowns and he has run for 130 yards on 31 carries and two TDs. # Eagles find tourney opponents are gunning for them

No. 5 ranked Eastwood girls soccer (18-2) reached their first tournament goal — facing off with No. 10 Liberty-Benton (16-2-2) Saturday in a Division III regional final.

"That's been kind of a back-and-forth affair where they've gotten the best of us more than we would have liked in a lot of close games," Eastwood coach Megan Rutherford said. "Our 1-0 win over them at home last year was awesome and we loved another chance to play them again."

To get there, junior forward Aubrey Haas scored twice, assisted both times by junior midfielder Kaylynn Simon, as the Eagles, repeat Northern Buckeye Conference champions, defeated visiting Archbold (14-2-4), 2-1, in a regional semifinal Tuesday.

Haas and Simon connected for the game-winner in overtime, and senior goalkeeper Jaylee Souder had one save on two shots on goal. The Eagles outshot the Blue Streaks, 28-5.

"I am so happy for our team. They played so well. The girls took pride in their defending and they were patient in their attack and it paid off," Rutherford said. "They are very resilient, they are so competitive and they are mentally tough."

This is a team that has outscored opponents 128-15 and is averaging nearly 6.5 goals per game. The only losses are to L-B, 2-0, in the second game of the season on Aug. 25 and to NBC foe Lake, 1-0, in the final game of the regular season on Oct. 15. Since then, it has been a four-game tournament run.

"I feel like we are peaking at the right time. The girls are really coming together and playing well and playing for each other. Their tempo has picked up in practice and their trust in each other has grown so much. They can count on each other to show up and give their all," Rutherford said.

"They have a common goal. They want to go all the way to the final. They want it all and our coaching staff is doing our best to help them achieve that goal. I've got the best staff. My assistants are rock stars. I am very blessed to have such great people to work with and I am blessed to have such a competitive team of young women to coach."

To reach the regional tournament, Eastwood defeated Huron (12-4-1), 6-0, Genoa (8-9-1) 4-0, and then Woodmore (13-4-2), 3-2, in a district final settled by a penalty kick shootout.

"We have not had any easy games in this tournament run. We've had some chaos behind the scenes because of COVID and they've handled it so well. I think it has gotten them a little refocused. Huron, we played really well, Genoa we played well and got another shutout."

The win over Genoa was Eastwood's 11th shutout, setting a school record.

"So, we were pumped about that. I know we were trying to get a lot of shutouts this year, even with bringing two freshmen on the back line," Rutherford said. "My starting back line is two freshmen, a sophomore and a junior. They are pretty young and doing super well."

#### Wildcats gave Eagles fits

The toughest district contest was the win over Woodmore, Rutherford said.

"It was not an easy win for sure. We knew it was not going to be though," Rutherford said. "They are a good team. They have got a lot of speed and a lot of young talent. That is good for our league. It keeps our league strong and they had kind of a rough season last year and she (coach Lauren Colangelo) has done a good job of rebuilding and getting them together. Their only league losses came to us and their other loss was to Liberty-Benton."

The contest went into overtime after Woodmore tied the game at two goals apiece, scoring on a corner kick by sophomore defender Rahzia Rios with 33 seconds remaining.

"They tied it up on a corner kick that went straight into the goal, under the crossbar back post with 33 seconds left, and that sent it into the first overtime. The wind kind of helped bend it in, and it was a well-struck kick," Rutherford said.

The Wildcats continued to keep the

Eagles in check during both overtimes.

"It was a stalemate. We had a lot of opportunities, but we just couldn't find the back of the net," Rutherford said. "We were really starting to wear them down because we subbed a lot more, but we just could not capitalize the 30 minutes of overtime so that sent it into PKs. (Jaylee Souder) almost had (nearly saved) the first PK — she hit it and didn't push it out enough, and it still hit the post and went in. The (remaining Woodmore) misses came from them just missing the goal."

Junior midfielder Kenna Souder leads the team with 33 goals, followed by Haas (23), junior midfielder Jada Jensen (12), sophomore midfielder Hannah Montag (9), freshman forward Delaine Zura (9), junior

midfielder Sydney Ameling (8) and sophomore midfielder Grace Kingery (6).

Montag leads the team in assists with 18, followed by Simon (16), Haas (12), Kenna Souder (10), Ameling (10), junior defender Mikayla Hoelter (8) and Zura and freshman defender Reilly Might have five assists each.

Jaylee Souder has made 55 saves on 65 shots (83.3 save percentage) and the team is allowing less than one goal per game.

"She's got great hands, definitely," Rutherford said.

Ameling leads the defense with 73 steals, followed by Jensen (50), sophomore defender Kayden Firsdon (41), Simon (40), Kenna Souder (34) and freshman defender Kayla Beuhler and Might have 26 each. Firsdon leads the Eagles in intercepts with 130, followed by Simon (125), freshman defender Amelia Ward (93), Ameling (70), Beuhler (61), junior defenders Mikayla Hoelter (49) and Megan Graham (48).

Like a lot of high school athletic programs, the Eagles have had to deal with extraordinary circumstances because of the pandemic.

"What helps make this team great is their capability of gratitude. They know what a blessing it is to play the game they love after the chaos this summer. We lost a crucial member of the team to quarantine (she is healthy but was near someone who was sick) the day before," Rutherford continued.

"(Junior midfielder) Kendall Gedert brought so much to us on and off the field. She loved to laugh. She played hard for her team and her teammates. We miss her. We had her on FaceTime during the game on a school iPad so she could experience it with us. I am so happy that they could have that experience on their home field."

The other affect the quarantine has had is limiting attendance, but community residents are watching the games online. In some cases, media has covered the games online.

"The Eastwood community has been awesome with their support and encouragement. These girls are making the community fall in love with the game of soccer," Rutherford said.




